FOR TICONDEROGA

10-12 September 2010

The Regiment, under the command of Captain Robert Falotico will appear at Fort Ticonderoga the weekend of 10-12 September. This is a Regimental event and all are expected to attend.

Time is allowed through the weekend to tour the fort and grounds, and you are urged to take advantage. No arms are allowed inside the Museum buildings. 18th Century discipline and dress will be maintained throughout the weekend. No vehicles should appear near camp except for setup, breakdown, and emergencies. Enter through the FRONT gate and exit through the BACK gate.

ARRIVAL: Camp set-up will be on Friday, September 10th, between 0900 and 2300 hrs. All participants must register upon their arrival. Registration on Friday will take place at the tent at the front entrance gate from 0900 to 2300 hrs. Late arrivals should register at the Fort's marquee in camp on Saturday morning. At registration, you will receive the event schedule for the weekend. Each unit will receive a clear trash bag. Additional bags will be available at the Fort's marquee as needed throughout the weekend. The dumpster for trash is located between the encampment field and the Log House.

SETTING UP CAMP: After registration, participants should drive to their respective camp and locate the quartermaster. The quartermaster will direct participants to their proper ground. Vehicles should be unloaded and moved to re-enactor parking before setting up camp to allow for a smooth arrival process for all. The ability to drive onto the field is dependent upon weather and ground conditions and will be a decision made that day.

PARKING: Re-enactors are asked to park in the designated re-enactor parking area. No vehicles are permitted on the road by camp from 0800 hrs Saturday until 1600 hrs. Sunday.

AMENITIES: Fort Ticonderoga will provide hay, firewood, and water for the weekend. Hay and firewood will be located at both ends of the encampment field. Portable toilets will also be located at both ends of the encampment field.

SAFETY INSPECTIONS: Each Army conducts its own inspections in the late morning each day. Any problems with weapons need to be identified at that time. The final inspection at 1330 hrs each afternoon is monitored by Fort-appointed safety officers. Failure to pass this inspection means the participant cannot participate in the tactical demonstration at 1400 hrs.

DRESS: Uniform shall be standard number 2 battle dress. Muskets to be equipped with flints and hammer-stalls. 18th Century discipline and dress will be maintained by all members for the weekend starting Saturday morning. Modern camp items must be concealed. Modern dress, wristwatches, etc., are not allowed.

DIRECTIONS: Travel is by private vehicle. The recommended route to Ticonderoga from eastern Massachusetts is: Take Route 3 or I-93 North into New Hampshire. Just south of Concord NH, take I-89 North. At White River Junction VT, take Route 4 West across Vermont through Rutland to Whitehall NY. Turn right (north) onto NY Route 22. Proceed approximately 26 miles to Ticonderoga. Turn right at Route 74

East. The Fort Entrance is on the right. Returning home on Sunday, one may choose to take the Ticonderoga Ferry across Lake Champlain, which runs costs \$9 one-way and runs until 1800 hrs.

0930 **Unit commanders and senior staff meet at the Fort's marquee across from Continental camp. ONE officer from each unit must attend. The adjutant of each army will call his roll. If your unit is not represented it will not participate in the tactical.**
